# Half a Decade of Making a Difference

According to the National Center on Charitable Statistics, about 12% of nonprofits fail to exist after 5 years. Add in a global pandemic a few months after opening the doors, and the number of nonprofits that survive are even fewer.

With the odds stacked against us, we knew staying true to our strong passion, clear vision, and steadfast commitment to a singular focus - teens and young adults with cancer - would lead us to success. This past July, our commitment paid off as we beat this statistic and celebrated five years in Syracuse.

Over the past five years, we have provided support to over 50 AYAs and their families, formed the CNY Cancer Alliance, a hub for local cancer resources, and hosted a variety of fundraising and community events.

To celebrate this milestone, we brought our successful comedy show, *Sometimes You Just Gotta Laugh!* to Syracuse. With over 100 tickets sold, Syracuse and Rochester AYAs had the entire Redhouse Arts Center laughing in the face of cancer. It was only fitting that our five year celebration raised over \$5,000, our largest Syracuse fundraiser to date!

From day one of demolition all the way to our five-year celebration, our mission has been to create a safe and supportive space for AYAs with cancer in Syracuse.

Thanks to the tireless dedication of our team, the support of our community, and the spirit of an amazing teen named Charlie driving it all, we have been successful in making that mission a reality for the past five years.

# **SPOTLIGHT ON**

# Dan Roach, Sound and Projection Designer

## Tell us a little about yourself and the work you do in the community.

I do sound design and projection design mostly for theatre. I really love to create and have always been that way. Both images that immerse you, and finding or creating original sound/music to underscore or enhance the theatre experience. I've been doing it for a while and it fits my laid back but detail oriented personality.

## From your perspective, how do audio-visual elements and sound design enhance or impact a production?

I realized early on the emotional impact music has in enhancing your connection to a production. The "perfect" music for a scene can help the actors and audience feel something quite profound. Images and animation have a similar impact. Together, it can be quite powerful when the tempo of the images match the tempo of the music being played. Watch a scene from a favorite movie without the sound sometime. You'll understand immediately.

#### How did you first get connected with 13thirty?

I first connected with 13thirty through an ask from PUSH Physical Theatre. They were working on Journeys way back in 2009 and knew of my skill with sound. I met Lauren and then helped on my first Journeys. It was an amazing show. So glad that I did!

# What about 13thirty continues to inspire and motivate you to stay involved?

I've always been blown away by the resiliency of the kids and young adults that I have met there, and the staff as well. They are so open and honest about their situation and I've always felt a bond that is hard to describe. It reminds me that no matter your situation, you can be positive and be yourself. Truly inspiring to be around.

# Can you share a memorable moment or experience you've had working with 13thirty that has left a lasting impact on you?

Preparing for my first Journeys, I was doing audio interviews and asked a few questions that brought tears from one of the young adults. I realized that no one had ever asked this before and it was a release of emotion that actually was helpful in the healing process for this individual even though it occurred 2 years out. This moment has been with me since that day.


#### **Understanding Impact: How Are Our Programs Benefiting AYAs?**

After the successful implementation of *Taco 'Bout it!* this year, it was important for us to evaluate if this new initiative aligned with our mission of improving the lives of AYAs with cancer. We were fortunate to have Dr. Ward Strickland, a pediatrician and advanced program evaluation student at the University of Rochester, evaluate this new series.


Two key themes emerged: the alleviation of psychological distress, and the sense of community/support. Interestingly, the specific topic of the program appeared less important than the shared experience itself. Many found 13thirty events in general to be a starting point for ongoing, supportive conversations, often centered around the challenges of living with cancer. The shared experiences helped build a community of peers grounded in empathy and mutual understanding. As Dr. Strickland noted, "This wasn't unique to this program, but rather a defining characteristic of 13thirty as a whole."

As we plan for 2025, it is imperative our programs align with our mission to make a difference in the lives of AYAs with cancer. Dr. Strickland said it best himself, "13thirty has filled a unique role in their lives that would not be filled otherwise."
